


How is front wheel drive better than rear wheel drive and how does that relate to a car club?

MAHC Volunteers at Second Harvest Heartland

From Cheryl Rademacher...

Did you know that 1 in 10 people in our region do not have enough to eat? According to Second Harvest (www.2harvest.org), more than one-third of K-12 students in Minnesota qualify for free or reduced-price lunches at school. In addition, senior citizens in our community are among the fastest growing segment of our population who visit a food shelf. More than half a million people in our area who are in working families visited food shelves last year due to food insecurity.

Second Harvest Heartland relies on donated food, money and volunteers to supply food to more than 200 food banks in central Minnesota and western Wisconsin. In 2014, Second Harvest supplied 89 million pounds of food, equaling 74 million meals, serving 532,000 people, with approximately 49% of the food donated fresh food. Impressive statistics!

On Saturday, February 7th, 24 MAHC members and friends gathered at Second Harvest in Golden Valley. (Dan Powell had a "déjà vu" moment at the warehouse, but more on that fun fact at the end of



this article!) As part of our shift, we collectively packaged 11,441 pounds of food including 3,877 lbs. of carrots and 3,178 lbs. of potatoes! The carrots and potatoes were weighed into 5-5.5 lb. amounts, placed into net bags and secured with a little foot pedal finesse from some of our Healey operators! With approximately 1.2 lbs. of food equaling one meal, we packed enough food to feed over 9,500 people. Suzanne also presented Second Harvest with a \$300 contribution from MAHC to further help with reducing hunger in our area.

Fresh produce packers for the day were: Suzanne & Greg Willodson, Curt Carlson and Teresa & Henry Boyer, Jana & Gene Berghoff, Dave & Cheryl Rademacher, Greg Lauser, Rich & Liz Stadther, Diane & Geoff Rossi, Dawn Errede & Bill Krause, Jane Schuler & Tom Hazen, Sue & Steve Greenway, Kim & Steve Rixen, Dan Powell, and Kathi Livolsi. After brushing the potato dust off, those who were able motored over to nearby Doolittle's Woodfire Grill for some good food and continued great conversation.

As promised, here is Dan Powell's fun fact---Dan told us this location of the Second Harvest warehouse is the exact location of his very first autocross! It was rumored he was eyeing one of the forklifts considering a spin around the warehouse for old times' sake. Maybe next time!

This was my winter-into-spring meal in 1977, every morning, every evening. I lived off my previous summer savings and a payday check from the plasma center, once every 8 days. Thinking back I'm glad I didn't have kids to provide for. Being involved in the Minnesota Austin Healey Club activities is not only fun, it makes you think, and it gives more than it takes. Yep, just another reason to be thankful.

When our daughter Jessica came to Carol and me some 24 years ago we had no idea what to expect but did what every parent tries to do by giving that child all the love, guidance, and sustenance you can muster. AND, at least in my case, hope that all the confusion and stumbling around at being a first time young father does not totally mess the child up.

Jessica, at 6 months of age, arrived shortly after our first Healey. A 1963 BJ7 that an overzealous would-be backyard restorer had managed to unscrew and disassemble every conceivable part (even the gauges were apart) before realizing he was way over his head and thus decided to sell the whole disassembled mess to the next fool called Jeff Johnk. As I looked over the sea of parts, while holding our newly arrived daughter, I was determined to rebuild that car without short changing our child. There was only one way to do that - move the baby playpen out into the garage on the weekends. Soon, Healey parts such as the steering wheel, seat belt buckles, fuel cap, gas pedal (Jessica really liked the gas pedal and still does today) old brake lines, knock offs, spark plug wires and all the normal stuff that youngsters play with, these all became her favorite toys. By the time Jessica was two years old the Healey restoration was complete and good thing as she was beginning to do her best to "help" me finish the project. What I did not realize at the time was that the last 2 years had molded her into a lifelong gear head. Now when the BJ 7 left the garage she had to be in it.

So, as we started attending MAHC meetings we naturally brought Jessica along in the Healey. All the men became her uncles and the ladies became her aunts. Giorgio Rossi became her big brother and I remember Giorgio taking her by the hand at club events and walking with her for hours amongst the parked Healeys and watching over her. And at the racetrack Jessica spent countless hours enjoying all the car lingo with Scott and Derek Lumbard. In fact we still have pictures of the 3 of them playing around the race trailers at Road America. She was with FAMILY. In the mid 90's I started racing a Healey with the VSCDA and VSCR vintage racing clubs. (There actually is a point to this story so please stay with me dear reader.) As with MAHC, members of VSCDA and VSCR became family and never did Carol or I worry about Jessica's security or well being at a club or race event as we knew she was amongst the most wonderful, responsible, and upstanding folks in the world. Tracks like Road America and Brainerd International Raceway became her Disneyland!

Then came 911 and Jessica, at 11 years old, was as moved as anyone. This was a watershed moment for her. She wanted to help the 911 victims so she solicited VSCDA and Road America to give her special permission to drive the golf cart throughout the paddock during race events to collect donations on behalf of the Red Cross. This was the start of Jessica getting to truly know everyone at the track and wanting to help in any way she could. Soon she was everywhere in the paddock running car parts, helping drivers bleed brakes, and most of all - working for the Timing and Scoring Department in the race tower which included organizing and running time sheets for Henry the announcer (who was a good friend to her and she so misses him), the grid workers, and the race drivers.

It has now been 13 wonderful years of volunteering her time and energies doing what she loves to do. The volunteer activities have been reward enough, so it came as quite a surprise to her when she was so richly rewarded on February 7th by being presented with the Art Bly Distinguished Service Award by VSCDA at their Awards Banquet in Chicago with Al Unser, Jr. as their keynote speaker. We've all heard the phrase: "It takes a village to raise a child." It's my thinking that the car clubs are Jessica's village.


