

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### Mathews Model Railroad Layout

On Saturday afternoon October 28<sup>th</sup>, we had the opportunity to see a 15 year labor of love come alive. Dick Mathews has had a love for trains – both the full size and the miniature size – for most of his life. As with the details of automobiles and their history, he can recite the same kind of statistics for trains – both large and small. He is really pleased to have met his goal of having a working layout for the locomotives, rolling stock, buildings, track, and hardware that he has been assembling for years. We are really pleased that he invited us to come see it.

The train bed is waist high and higher to make it more accessible to work on. There are a few different levels for the trains to navigate, as well as many bridges to cross. There are limits on the amount of change to the levels (or grade), as the trains cannot climb steep slopes. The size of the layout is 16' by 36', which allows for (and demands) a lot of track, landscape, and buildings. Some of the buildings are from kits that were made, but many of them are deftly made from scratch using plans from model railroading magazines. Dick has plenty of all !

These are O Gauge trains, which are a bit larger than the old Lionel types, and they have more authentic detailing. A mixture of the old steam type locomotives as well as the more current diesel types is present – and there are many ! There are both freight and passenger cars (rolling stock). The power does not come from the old transformers, but is run by electronics now. This allows for more options when operating, as well as for signage, crossing lights, and other things requiring illumination.

Karla was in charge of the refreshments and goodies as we entered. Club members are always ready to snack and sip when assembling for an event. It was a very unique opportunity for us to see and try to appreciate all the work that Dick put in to this project. It is truly beautiful and fun at the same time. Many thanks to Dick and Karla for inviting us to witness this wonderful assemblage.


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### Trains, Trains, Trains.....











#### **Tech Tip for October / November**

October is the month to at least think about Winter Storage of our Healeys.

Probably the most important procedure is to Change the Oil and Filter. Do NOT wait and change the oil in the spring. The combustion process creates carbon deposits in the oil. These carbon deposits combine with water, another byproduct of combustion creating acids which will etch and erode the internal surfaces of your engine all winter long.

If, for example, you go on the Fall Colour Tour and it is the last time you will drive until spring, immediately dump the warm oil and remove the filter (check that the gasket comes with it).

Refill the crankcase with the recommended oil (usually 20W-50 with zinc and phosphorus additive for our flat tappet cams). If you have a modern spin-on filter, fill the filter using one of the quarts while the others are being poured into the crankcase. If you have the stock filter, remove the filter body and clean it insuring the spring, filter plate, cartridge and gaskets are installed per the manual.

PLEASE NOTE: The process of filling the crankcase with the spin-on filter NOT installed is important. There is a check valve built into the spin-on filter which will 'air lock' and not allow the fresh oil to enter the oil pump if the filter is installed before the oil is filled.

After the oil is filled, install the mostly oil-filled spin-on filter. Disconnect the White wire with the Black Stripe from the coil to distributor (stock ignition system) so the engine will not fire. Run the starter until you see oil pressure register on the gage. Once the engine shows oil pressure, reconnect the wire, start the engine and verify there are no leaks at the filter or drain plug.

NOTE: If your engine oil pump pressure will not come up with about 15 to 20 seconds on initial crank and you have a spin-on filter, unscrew it until it is not firmly against the adapter, then crank the engine while watching for oil to flow out. When oil does flow out, immediately re-tighten the filter and then crank it again until oil pressure registers on the gage. Once it does, reconnect the wire and start the engine.

After the engine has passed the leak check, drive for a few miles (fill with fuel) to thoroughly dilute any old oil which remained in the engine, then park it for the winter, and disconnect the battery.

### **Cooling Tech Tip**

Ethylene Glycol is the most popular chemical used to keep your engine block and cooling system from turning into an (cracked) ice cube in winter. It comes in green or red and it carries chemical additives which aid in preventing rust and corrosion year round. Unfortunately for our pets and kids, it also has a 'sweet' taste which is found attractive to the unwary and can be ingested in a quantity which will cause injury, long term organ damage, or death.



Propylene glycol anti-freeze is also available which is no less injurious to living things, but it does not have the attractive sweet taste of ethylene glycol. Prestone Lo-Tox is the one brand name I could find available, carried by some O'Reilly Auto Parts stores. My local store ordered a case, of which I purchased a number of gallons.

A 50/50 mix of concentrated antifreeze and water, (distilled is best) will give -34° F freeze protection for Ethelyne and -32° for Propylene. If you decide to use a Low Tox type of anti-freeze, you will need to also update your tester to one made for propylene. The picture is of a propylene tester (green bulb). If it were a ethylene version it would have a black bulb.



Modern antifreeze serves another function in that it inhibits corrosion of steel and aluminum parts by having what is termed 'reserve alkalinity' (RA). Test strips which test the amount of 'reserve alkalinity' are available at your local auto parts store or can be found at website like Amazon.com in various quantities. By dipping these strips in your radiator fluid you will find a pad portion of the strip changes colors. One of the strips colors will tell if your antifreeze has sufficient RA to protect your engine from corrosion. The strips also have a pad which will tell the freeze protection level. Level of protection is indicated by comparing the color of the pad with a color chart provided.



If your antifreeze no longer has the freeze protection or reserve alkalinity to protect your engine, or if your fluid is full of rust and looks bad you may need to flush your cooling system. This can be done in your driveway or done at your local oil change business for a reasonable price where your fluid should be removed, filtered, chemically adjusted for RA and freeze protection and returned to your system. (Precision Tune advertises for \$49.90.) If you choose to do it in your driveway, there are some videos in YouTube on flushing and reverse flushing your engine, radiator and heater core at: <u>http://www.youtube.com/</u>

If you do it in your driveway you will have some old antifreeze to dispose. Minnesota Pollution Control Agency guidelines are available as a PDF file at their website at:

http://www.pca.state.mn.us/index.php/view-document.html?gid=4057 which state small quantities may be disposed of through sanitary sewer systems which will be able to filter and dilute it. The document also has a list of businesses which re-cycle antifreeze or take it to the Arden Hills National Guard facility (MN 96 and Hamline Ave) where there is an oil and antifreeze recycling facility.
